



Job Vacancies by Duration of Opening

Statewide Job Vacancies Average Number of Persons Unemployed Per Vacancy

- The number of job vacancies statewide decreased by 50.6 percent from 2007 to 2009, and then increased by 24.5 percent from 2009 to 2010.
- The number of unemployed individuals per job vacancy increased from just over one person in 2007 and 2008, to four people in 2009, then decreased to three people in 2010.


There were 32,091 estimated job vacancies in Kansas during the second quarter of 2010.



Statewide Job Vacancies Job Vacancy Rate and Average Wage Offer




- The statewide average minimum wage offer for all positions was \$12.18 per hour and the average maximum wage offer was \$15.13 per hour.
- Local Area III offered the highest average wages, while Local Area V offered the lowest.
- Approximately 17.5 percent of the job vacancies reported statewide paid at least \$14.00 per hour.
- Local Area IV had the highest job vacancy rate of 2.9 percent. The statewide job vacancy rate was 2.3 percent.

Statewide Job Vacancies Top Five Most Vacant Occupations



- The top five most vacant occupations represent approximately 18.7 percent of all job vacancies in Kansas.
- The top two most vacant occupations in the state were healthcare-related occupations.
- The Education and Health Services industry reported the largest number of vacancies statewide and in every local area.

Statewide Job Vacancies Percent of Vacancies by Education Requirement



- The largest percentage of job vacancies in Kansas, 36.7 percent, required a high school diploma or GED. Approximately 13.2 percent of the job vacancies in Kansas required bachelor's or advanced degrees.
- Job vacancies requiring an advanced degree (master's and above) received more than three times the wage of those requiring a high school diploma or a GED.
- Job vacancies which required a bachelor's degree paid more than twice as much as those requiring a high school diploma or a GED.

DID YOU KNOW?

During the second quarter of 2010, 45.9 percent of the job vacancies throughout Kansas offered a starting wage of \$10.99 or below, while 7.0 percent offered a starting wage of \$20.00 or above.
